



Dec. 1, 2023, marked the historic launch of Medicaid expansion in North Carolina, extending health care coverage over the next two years to more than 600,000 newly eligible North Carolinians.

As of today, more than 275,000 individuals have Medicaid health care coverage because of Medicaid expansion.



More than 260,000 beneficiaries previously on the Family Planning Program (FPP) were moved to full coverage Medicaid as of Dec. 1.

- While ALL individuals receiving Family Planning Program benefits were evaluated for eligibility through Medicaid expansion, ONLY those who met the criteria for expansion (ages19-64 with income up to 138% of the federal poverty level) received full coverage beginning Dec. 1.
- Pre-recorded phone calls, text messages, and/or emails were sent Nov. 6 to those eligible to let them know someone in their household is eligible for full Medicaid coverage and to check their mail for more information.
- Eligible beneficiaries were mailed an eligibility notice, a letter from the NC Medicaid Enrollment Broker explaining their health care options, and a Welcome Packet from their health plan (if applicable).



With the launch of expansion, we have experienced high call volumes in the NC Medicaid Enrollment Broker and NC Medicaid Ombudsman call centers.

Our partners are adding call agents and closely monitoring the situation. We are seeing improvement.

Beneficiaries have 90 days to change their health plan. If they wish to change, they should call the NC Medicaid Enrollment Broker at **1-833-870-5500** (TTY: 711 or <u>RelayNC.com</u>)

To change their primary care provider (PCP), beneficiaries should call their health plan (use the phone number on their Medicaid ID card). PCP changes can be made through Aug. 31, 2024.

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AUTOMATIC RENEWALS FOR CHILDREN

NC Medicaid received approval from CMS to automatically extend Medicaid eligibility for all children under the age of 19 for 12 months without receiving recertification (renewal).


This will continue through the end of the State's continuous coverage unwinding period and ensures children's Medicaid coverage is uninterrupted as our local Departments of Social Services deal with an increase workload due to the continuous coverage unwinding and Medicaid expansion.





More North Carolinians can get health care coverage through Medicaid.

- North Carolina is providing health care coverage to more people through Medicaid.
- Medicaid now covers people ages 19 through 64 years with higher incomes.
- You may be able to get Medicaid even if you didn't qualify before.
- Medicaid pays for doctor visits, yearly check-ups, emergency care, mental health and more – at little or no cost to you.





Coverage through Medicaid lets you get the health care you need.

Medicaid covers most health services, including, but not limited to:

- primary care so you can go to a doctor for a check-up or when you are not feeling well
- hospital services when you need to stay overnight (inpatient) or when you can go home the same day (outpatient)
- maternity and postpartum care if you are pregnant and after giving birth

- prescription drug benefits to pay for your medicines
- behavioral health
- preventive and wellness services
- dental and oral health services
- medical-related devices and other therapies

Are immigrants eligible for Medicaid?

Some non-U.S. citizens can get health coverage through Medicaid. **To be eligible you must:**

- Live in North Carolina
- Be a non-citizen with qualified immigration status. (Most people must wait five years.) Qualified immigration status includes:
 - Lawful Permanent Residents (LPR/Green Card Holder)
 - Asylees
 - Refugees
 - Cuban/Haitian entrants
 - · Paroled into the U.S. for at least one year
 - Conditional entrant granted before 1980
 - Battered non-citizens, spouses, children or parents

- Victims of trafficking and his or her spouse, child, sibling or parent or individuals with a pending application for a victim of trafficking visa
- · Granted withholding of deportation
- Member of a federally recognized Indian tribe or American Indian born in Canada
- Citizens of the Marshall Islands, Micronesia and Palau who are living in one of the U.S. states or territories (referred to as Compact of Free Association or COFA migrants)

Non-citizens without documents who do not qualify for full health coverage under Medicaid may be able to get coverage for emergency conditions that need to be treated in an emergency room.





How much does Medicaid cost me?

- You do not have to pay monthly premiums.
- Medicaid pays the cost for most health care services.
- The highest copay is \$4 and is only required for some services.





BASIC ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

NC Medicaid may be available to people who are:

- Low-income individuals and families
- Age 65 or older
- Blind or disabled
- Infants and children under the age of 21

You also must:

- Pregnant
- In need of long-term care
- Receiving Medicare

- Be a U.S. citizen or show proof of eligible immigration status If you are applying for only emergency services, you are not required to provide documentation of immigration status.)
- Live in North Carolina and show proof of residency
- · Have a Social Security number or show you have applied for one

You are automatically eligible for Medicaid if you receive any of the following:

- Supplemental Security Income (SSI)
- State/County Special Assistance for the Aged or Disabled

What information do I need to apply?

It takes time to complete an application. Here is information you need to provide for each person applying:

- Full legal name
- Date of birth (for at least one person applying)
- A complete mailing address
- A signed application

If you are not sure if you are eligible, we suggest you apply anyway.

North Carolina uses external resources to verify the information you provide. If more information is needed, you will receive a letter in the mail from your local Department of Social Services (DSS).

What documents can be used if DSS asks for more information?

North Carolina Residency	 A photo ID with your NC address listed, or A utility bill, or A lease or mortgage agreement, or Vehicle registration, or Documentation of employment, or If you do not have any documentation, you can check a box in ePASS labeled "NC Residency Declaration"
Income	 If you're Employed - pay stubs, employer verification or your most recent tax return to show proof of your income. If you're Self-Employed - your most recent tax return or copies of your business records. If you don't have that, you can fill out a <u>Verification Form for Self-Employment Income and Expenses</u> form.
Date of Birth	 A photo ID with your date of birth listed, or Birth certificate
Social Security Number	 A copy of your Social Security card or proof you've applied for one, or Another official document containing your name and SSN, or A military ID card
Citizenship	Birth Certificate, orPassport
Immigration Status	A copy of your VISA/immigration card



After I apply, how long does it take to find out if I can be covered through Medicaid?

It may take up to 45 days after you apply. Incomplete applications may take longer. **You can help the process go faster by:**

- Applying online at ePASS and providing all information requested. If the application is incomplete, it may take longer to process. DSS will reach out to you if they do not have what is needed to complete your application, so be sure to respond to mail or phone calls.
- Keeping your contact information up-to-date in ePASS, so you don't miss important information about your Medicaid benefits.
 - Sign up for an enhanced ePASS account. An enhanced ePASS account allows you to keep your information updated without having to contact your local DSS.

What happens once I'm approved?

- Most people who get health coverage through Medicaid are part of NC Medicaid Managed Care. This means you can choose the health plan that is best for you.
- All health plans offer the same base services. Some have extra services. Each has its own network of doctors and professionals.
- You can choose your health plan and your primary care doctor your family doctor, clinic or health care provider when you apply.
- You will receive a health care plan ID card in the mail. It will come from the health plan that you selected during the application process. If you did not select a health plan, one will be assigned to you. You have 90 days to pick a new one. You will receive a packet from the NC Medicaid Enrollment Broker that tells you how to change plans.
- Your ID card also has the name of your primary care doctor. If you did not choose one when you applied, one will be assigned to you.

WHAT IF I'M STILL NOT ELIGIBLE?

- You may be able to get coverage through the Federal Marketplace at <u>HealthCare.gov</u>.
 - Letters will be sent to people who may now be eligible for Medicaid:
 - **Mid-December:** People who applied at the marketplace and have household incomes below 100% FPL. This group could include beneficiaries who were moved to Medicaid expansion from the Family Planning Program.
 - Early-February 2024: People who are currently receiving marketplace coverage and have household incomes between 100% FPL and 150% FPL.
- Open enrollment for 2024 began Nov.1, 2023, and ends Jan.16, 2024. (You can apply at other times of the year if you qualify for special enrollment such as loss of a job, change in family circumstance or loss of Medicaid coverage.)
- Households with incomes up to 400% of the federal poverty level may be eligible for help to pay for health coverage.
- If you don't have health insurance, you can get basic health care services at federally-qualified health centers, rural health clinics and free and charitable clinics. Costs vary based on income. Learn more at ncdhbs.gov/divisions/office-rural-health/safety-net-resources

What if I previously had limited benefits through Family Planning Medicaid?

If you had Family Planning Medicaid before Dec. 1, 2023, and met the new eligibility rules, you automatically receive full Medicaid coverage as of Dec. 1, 2023. If you were automatically enrolled, you:

- Got a letter from your local Department of Social Services letting you know you will start getting full Medicaid coverage.
- Were assigned a health plan. If you want to change it, you will have 90 days to pick a new one.
- Got a welcome packet from your health plan with a new Medicaid ID card. Your ID card also has the name of your primary care doctor. You can change the doctor that was assigned by contacting your health plan.
- If you have health coverage through HealthCare.gov, you need to cancel that plan. **Do not cancel** your plan until you receive information from your new health plan through Medicaid.

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
